

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

I am very excited to let you know that in the coming year we are creating new opportunities for shared experiences by offering exhibitions with challenging narratives that feature works from the permanent collection, celebrate our local arts community, and reveal and promote campus wide research.

Conceived as a contemporary response to the Fall installation of seascapes by Frederick Judd Waugh, In the Wake features a selection of film and video, also from the museum's collection, that employ water as a central theme.

We are introducing Solving for X, a series of exhibitions organized by the Ulrich Museum of Art in collaboration with university scholars across campus. The intent of the Museum is to work with WSU scholars in all disciplines who are problem solving for sustainability to create visualizations of their research. The visualizations will be featured in a series of exhibition projects at the Ulrich Museum of Art beginning this spring.

Kevin Mullins: Fire in the Paint Locker, a thirty year retrospective will be the focus of the entire museum this summer, joining a long history of exhibitions featuring artists from our vital arts community.

Please mark your calendars for three long awaited sculpture dedications planned for this summer. Randy Regier's The Celestial Mechanic, Elyn Zimmerman's Font and Tom Otterness' Shockers will extend the unique and exceptional range of contemporary works included in the Martin H. Bush Outdoor Sculpture Collection on WSU's campus.

We are in the final phase of digitizing the more than 6,700 works of art in the Ulrich Museum's permanent collection. This summer a portal to the collection on the Museum's website will offer for the first time, to anyone in the world, access to searchable data fields and images for each object. WSU students and faculty as well as other interested parties will be able to research, curate and contribute to scholarship on the collection.

In looking forward to next year's Salon Circle we are following a history of including cultural visionaries. The 2019-2020 series will feature a fascinating program of futurists who are changing the present in the world today.

IN THE WAKE

January 24 – March 31, 2019 Polk/Wilson & Amsden Galleries

In the Wake features a selection of film and video from the Museum's permanent collection that employ water as a central motif. The exhibition was conceived as a contemporary response to Frederick Judd Waugh's paintings of seascapes on view in the Beren Gallery. In the Wake consists of time-based media that convey the dynamic properties of water in ways that both intersect and diverge from Waugh's paintings. The artists employ scale, sound and movement to explore the force and scope of water, simultaneously focusing on its relationship to human experience. They highlight water as a repository of memory, an entity that facilitates migration, labor and commerce, and as a receptacle that both receives and engenders trauma and violence. In the Wake displays water's fluid traits and what remains from our encounters with it.

New Initiatives: *SOLVING FOR X = Sustainability*

A series of exhibitions organized by the Ulrich Museum of Art in collaboration with university scholars across campus. The intent of the Museum is to work with WSU scholars in all disciplines who are problem solving for sustainability to create visualizations of their research. The objective is to explore the potential for the Museum, as a WSU public access point for the community, to make accessible the fascinating and essential research taking place on campus. We are thrilled by the opportunity to work with researchers across campus and excited about the challenges we will face together in discovering how to create visual pathways to understanding.

Acid Mine Drainage: Working to Improve Passive Remediation Systems

January 24 - March 31, 2019 | Gra ly Gallery

Our first Solving for X project is a collaboration with Dr. Andrew Swindle, assistant professor in the Geology Department. Dr. Swindle is a contaminant hydrogeologist with extensive experience in the use of electron microscopy and X-ray diffraction to investigate colloidal and nano-scale materials. The research highlighted here is connected to the remediation of Acid Mining Drainage (AMD). AMD is the acidic, metal-laden solution produced by the oxidation of sulfide minerals exposed from mining activities. It is a significant environmental problem in most countries that have an extensive history of mining, and is estimated to have adversely impacted 10,000's of km of streams in the United States alone. Because of the large number of impacted sites there is considerable drive to develop low-cost remediation options. One option is the use of limestone trenches to neutralize AMD; however, when AMD is neutralized iron (hydr)oxide minerals can precipitate coating the remaining limestone and lowering the effectiveness of the trench. This research investigates using a mix of sandstone and limestone to ameliorate limestone armoring to increase the effectiveness of this remediation option.

Kevin Mullins was known for producing compelling, complex, luminous, lyrical surfaces. He was at the height of his career when he passed away suddenly in March of 2018. A celebration of his work and life seems most fitting as his artistic career included 15 years at the Ulrich Museum as Exhibitions Curator.



SUMMER SCULPTURE DEDICATIONS



Randy Regier *The Celestial Mechanic*, 2016–2018, Aluminum, stainless steel, tempered glass, 96 x 60 in.

Randy Regier proposed to create a public sculpture entitled *The Celestial Mechanic* "that is resonant with the culture and aesthetic of sky and flight and dreams of space – yet rooted and connected to the earth and to community history and the passage of time. These are very Kansas things to me, and a large part of why I choose to live and work here." Regier has a BFA in sculpture from Kansas State University and an MFA in studio arts from Maine College of Art. He is represented in numerous museums and private collections nationwide including the Emprise Bank Collection, Marianna Kistler Beach Museum of Art, and the Spencer Museum of Art. Public commissions include Salina Arts Commission, the Wichita Public Library Foundation and most recently *Open Spaces*, an international sculpture biennial installed in parks and urban spaces throughout Kansas City, Missouri.




Elyn Zimmerman *Font*, 1993, Black granite, pink granite, water, 42 x 120 x 72 in.

Font was inspired by an ancient Egyptian altar that featured a round stone sunk into a table. In this interpretation, the round stone of the original altar is replaced by a polished black granite disk. Elyn Zimmerman holds undergraduate and graduate degrees in Fine Art from UCLA. Born in Philadelphia, PA, she has lived in New York City since 1977. Since the late 1970s Zimmerman has executed numerous temporary site-specific outdoor sculptural installations for major museums all over the world. Her permanent outdoor sculpture installations are marked by their use of stone and water, as well as their reference to the natural landscape. Zimmerman's work is held in the permanent collections of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, the British Museum, the Museum of Modern Art, the New Orleans Museum of Art as well as several corporate collections.

Tom Otterness Shockers, 2019 Steel, hay bales Dimensions to be determined

The proposed work *Shockers* is influenced by the large-scale outdoor sculpture *Makin' Hay* which resided at Wichita State University for two years. Similarly this new work depicts day laborers yet in this instance there are only two. Depicted in an embrace during a break in their work, the installation celebrates both camaraderie and the history of the "shockers," the nickname given to the students who used to earn money for their studies by harvesting wheat during the early days of WSU. *Shockers* was commissioned by Adam Beren and sisters Amy Bressman and Julie Platt in honor of their mother, Joan S. Beren, one of WSU's strongest fine arts supporters. Joan Beren received a Master of Arts degree from the Fairmount College of Liberal Arts & Sciences, at WSU in 1983 and was an ardent champion of the University and, in particular, the Martin H. Bush Outdoor Sculpture Collection for which she established a conservation fund in 2016. Tom Otterness is widely known as one of the most popular public sculptors in North America. His works in bronze, which adorn many plazas and outdoor spaces throughout the world, are recognized for their playful, cartoon-like appearance and accessible nature although they often touch on serious topics such as issues of class, race, and gender.





A SCULPTOUR AFFAIR: A Celebration of Sculpture

The biannual benefit event for the Ulrich Museum of Art

A SculpTour Affair celebrates the renowned Martin H.
