

Eija-Liisa Ahtila | The Annunciation

Beren Gallery

The exhibition consists of two large-scale video installations by the Finnish artist Eija-Liisa Ahtila. Since the 1990s, Ahtila has been a pioneer of immersive video installations that expand on the possibilities of cinema as an art form, make multiple perspectives visible at the same time, and offer a new mode of viewing time-based works in gallery spaces. This will be the first presentation of work by Ahtila in Kansas and the Great Plains region.

"Can something already familiar fulfill the criteria for a miracle?" asks the narrator in Eija-Liisa Ahtila's *The Annunciation*. To answer that question, *The Annunciation* re-presents one of the best-known Christian stories in a dramatically new way, deconstructing the Renaissance imagery which has shaped our collective perception of that miraculous moment and focusing on an interpretation presented by non-professional human actors and animals, whose perspective for Ahtila emerges as another path to the divine.

Eija-Liisa Ahtila | The Bridge

Amsden Gallery

A mother walks through the streets of Helsinki as she narrates her experience of dealing with repressed memories of childhood abuse and the resulting mental breakdown. When she comes to a bridge and falls down, she is unable to get back up, ultimately crossing the bridge by crawling on all fours. Metaphor and fact blur in the film, as do past and present. It becomes unclear to viewers which is which, just as it is unclear to the woman herself. The film is a poignant depiction of psychosis triggered by trauma that allows viewers to embody the narrator's first-person experience.





Ann Resnick | Chapter & Verse

Polk/Wilson Gallery

Ann Resnick has been making conceptually complex and visually sumptuous art for over forty years. She starts with the personal—her own family history, marriage, broad reading tastes, and friendships with a large circle of correspondents near and far. She then turns the raw materials of her life into deeply moving universal ruminations on loss and remembrance, the need to capture intangible emotional ties through tangible objects, and the beauty that can be found in the awareness of the finitude of our time on earth. Ann is also a pillar of contemporary art in Wichita who has worked for twenty-five years as a gallerist, activist, and exhibiting artist to benefit our community. Shown nationally and internationally, however, much of her work has never been seen in Wichita. This exhibition will present the highlights of her artistic career going back to the 1990s, showcasing her inventiveness in a variety of media, painstaking dedication to her craft, and ability to create beauty and meaning out of the most basic facts of every human life.

Annabel Daou | DECLARATION

An Ulrich Connections Project in Partnership with the Rhatigan Student Center

Grace Memorial Chapel, Wichita State University campus Open 8 a.m. - 8 p.m., Monday-Friday

The Ulrich is pleased to present *DECLARATION*, a sound installation by artist Annabel Daou, inside the Harvey D. Grace Memorial Chapel in the heart of the WSU campus. Annabel Daou is a Lebanese American artist known for her poetic conceptual pieces that often mine history and use language across multiple media to empower viewers in the present moment. In the 25-minute audio piece, Daou recites a long list of first-person actions based on everyday expressions and lines the artist borrowed from others. These are interspersed with both sounds of peaceful city life and chants from recent protests in Chile, Lebanon, and other places around the world. The work is a moving reminder of the feminist maxim that the personal is political and an exploration of the way each one of us has the power to contribute to large-scale social movements through a surprisingly wide range of possible actions.

Voices from the Vault | The 1990's

What stories can be found among the 6,700 works of art that live in storage at the Ulrich Museum? Voices from the Vault is a series of invited talks designed to help answer this question in the run-up to the Ulrich's 50th anniversary in December 2024. Taking place over the course of five years, these programs focus on art made in the five decades of the Museum's existence and illuminate the connections between the art of our time and key events and phenomena of our shared recent history.

This year, we are diving into the 1990s—the last hurrah of the 20th century—featuring talks with artist **Lesley Dill** and print-maker/activist **Jos Sances**, both of whose observations are germane to the formation of 21st century American identity. They examine the social and political reverberations of important topics in that decade that continue to resonate today.

Teaching & Learning

Collection Study Program

Within the teaching museum, experiential learning extends from the museum to the campus to the world. Following WSU's strategic plan, how do we participate and contribute to the education of students to meet challenges that face our future leaders such as globalization, health, energy, environment, and infrastructure? Through open invitations to participate with actual physical objects, students connect their personal experiences and interests with the long social histories of works of art. The results are increased opportunities for deep and holistic learning experiences where our students become passionate positive forces in the world – willing to act for the common good.

The Ulrich Museum's over 6,700 works of art are a universal resource for teaching and learning. Our education department works closely with faculty and educators to develop curricular resources and provide Visual Thinking Strategies sessions with works of art that connect to course topics. In these discussions, students develop both the confidence and language skills to debate complex ideas with their classmates and at the same time learn to disagree civilly and build on information and ideas from others.

K-12 Resources

Located in the public space of the Museum, the Study Center offers students, faculty, educators, scholars, artists, and the community access to original works of art. The Study Center is equipped with state-of-the-art displays, computer stations for research and browsing the Online Collection Portal, a digital projector, and a resource library. The new Student Lounge adjacent to the Center provides a comfortable space to converse, study, or meet up with friends.

Dawoud Bey has been exploring the possibilities of photographic portraiture since the 1970s. Bey engages his subjects directly, learning their stories and collaborating with them on the process of creating portraits. *Georgia and Trina* is a portrait of friends Trina Averette and Georgia Ramirez created at Columbia College in Chicago. Bey worked with a large-scale Polaroid camera—one of only five made by the Polaroid corporation—to take multiple photographs, fragmenting the composition and mixing parts for the final portrait. Bey has commented on his Polaroid portraits: "My use of color has to do with wanting to make an unabashedly lush and romantic rendering of people who seldom receive that kind of attention." Trentin Williams and Willie Robinson (below) comes from the series The Birmingham Project, photographs first exhibited in 2013 on the 50th anniversary of the 16th Street Baptist Church bombing in Birmingham, Alabama. In this series, Bey was reflecting on the tragic events surrounding the 1963 bombing of the church and the racially motivated murders on the same day of two teenage Black boys. Bey paired older residents of Birmingham, people the same age as the slain children would have been, with young people who were the same age as the slain kids at the time of their death. The resulting pairings are a wrenching memorialization of the lives lost during the struggle for civil rights for African Americans. They are also urgent comments on the need to end for good racially motivated violence in America.

Since the 1990s, Mark Dion has created works that use conceptualist tactics to explore his interests in both visual art and natural science. At once insightful and wryly funny, Dion explores the ways we represent nature, the culture of collecting, and the methodologies, presentation modes, and institutional frameworks used to create different forms of knowledge. The portfolio Museum Culture captures both the scope of Dion's interests and his hallmark humor. The artist uses the techniques associated with the natural sciences to turn art museums into his objects of study. For example, he classifies types of museum visitors as though they were fauna and notable figures in the history of American museology as though they are Darwin's finches. Through such juxtapositions of disciplinary methodologies, these prints offer a surprisingly thorough introduction to the histories, concerns, and challenges that shape the work of American museums today. The Ulrich is excited for these works to give our viewers insights into the inner workings of museums as complex, contradictory, and continuously evolving institutions.

Youth Arts Council Takeover



Ruth Ann Forsberg-Martin

Last October, we lost our dear friend Ruth Ann Forsberg-Martin. Ruth Ann and her husband Scott Martin have been tremendous supporters of the Ulrich over the years. Anyone who attended one of our parties, exhibitions, or programs surely met Ruth Ann; a teacher of 32 years, she was the most welcoming and kind-spirited person you could ever meet, with a smile that lit up the Museum. More than just a friendly face, Ruth Ann served on our Ulrich Alliance for four years (2014-2018), and was so important to us that we nominated her for the American Alliance of Museums' "Search for the Great Museum Advocate" contest in 2013. Ruth Ann was also the inspiration behind the 2014 Ulrich exhibition, Fill It to the Brim, which paid tribute to her strength and radiance in defiance of her struggle with ovarian cancer.
